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# INAUGURATION OF TATA CENTRAL ARCHIVES

The Tata Central Archives located in the precincts of the Tata Management Training Centre, Pune was formally inaugurated by Mr. Ratan N. Tata, Chairman, Tata Group of companies on February 13, 2001 in the presence of a distinguished gathering.

The Archives were thrown open to the public on March 3, 2001, which commemorates the birth anniversary of the Founder, J. N. Tata. The Archives are open to the public on Monday to Saturday from  $10.30\,\text{A.M.}$  to  $5\,\text{P.M.}$

#### EXHIBITION OF J. N. TATA

The exhibition of Jamsetji Nusserwanji Tata (1839-1904), the Founder of the House of Tata, focussing on his life, industrial ventures and philanthropic work has been categorised into serveral sections. These sections include the Tata Family, Phases of Jamsetji's Life, The three Textile Mills, Esplanade House, The Indian Institute of Science, The Tata Iron and Steel Company, The Taj Mahal Hotel, The Tata Electric Companies and The Last Days of Jamsetji, each section being enhanced by restored photographs and relevant documents. Among the exhibits, the original agreement of the J. N. Tata Endowment scholarship awarded to Mr. K. R. Narayanan, the President of India is being displayed.

students from various schools are visiting the Archives.





# Transcript of the letter written by Dadabhai Naoroji to Jamsetji Tata

Washington House, 77 Anerley Park, London S. E. January 22, 1903

Dear Mr. Jamsetji,

I read in the "Kaiser-i-Hind", of the 28th inst. about you and your Iron Industry, "We are also pleased to learn that the capital Mr. Tata proposes to raise will be indigenous and not borrowed from outside India". I need not say with what delight I read that sentence. I must have written to you before, I think, that any drain of vegetable wealth, such as tea, coffee, re., is reproducible.

Whenever India will be able to develop its own resources, it will be able to reproduce these things; but mineral wealth or its value once lost, is a loss for <u>ever</u>. All the gold and coal, and such mineral wealth that is now being exploited by British capital, and its produce taken away out of the country, is a loss for ever. This mineral product can never be reproduced. The "Kaiser" further says, "His name is a guarantee that that capital will be easily forthcoming whenever it is called." I share that sentiment, and I hope you may fully succeed in doing this. With my best wishes for success in your undertakings.
